

# Deep History Detectives: Tracking artefacts on the North Norfolk Coast

Additional information for using the CITIZAN App to record replica artefacts

Thank you for taking part in the Deep History Detectives [DHD] project. This project will help us to understand more about how artefacts move along the coastline – how far do they move and over what timeframe?

Key points:

- We are using replica artefacts for this project and recording them with the CITIZAN app.
- Acceptance of the Ts&Cs when downloading this app will be taken as your consent to taking part in this study (see the small print for details).
- Please read the safety advice at the end of this information sheet carefully.
- Please create a new record each time you record an artefact, even if you have recorded that artefact before. This will help us track the journey of each artefact.
- Once you have recorded a replica artefact, please leave the artefact where you found it!

**Please be aware of incoming tides, overhead cliffs and other beach dangers.**

As well as recording the location of the replica artefacts it would be useful to know how much of the beach you walked during your visit. This can be done by creating ‘features’ to show a) your start point, b) the point furthest from your start point, and c) your endpoint.

## Feature name

For the *Deep History Detectives* project the Feature name will be the ID written on the artefact. If you are creating a ‘feature’ to show the start/middle/end of your walk please write this in *Feature name*.

## Description

If recording a replica artefact for the *Deep History Detectives* project please include **Happisburgh DHD artefact** in your description, plus a short description of where you found the artefact.

## Photographs

If you are recording an artefact for the *Deep History Detectives* project please include:

- A photograph of the artefact as you found it.
- A photograph of the artefact in the wider landscape, i.e. a location shot that includes something that would be identifiable on a future visit to the beach.

Additional comments for the *Deep History Detectives* project might include:

- The start and end point of your visit (if you haven’t recorded these as features).
- The amount of time you spent on the beach.
- Weather observations, especially if there had been a recent storm.
- Any damage to the artefact.

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## CITiZAN Health and Safety

CITiZAN wants you to be safe while out on the foreshore, so please follow the guidelines below.

**Never put yourself or others at risk when recording and monitoring for CITiZAN. If you are unsure or feel that the situation is unsafe for any reasons do not continue.**

- Always work with at least one other person; never work by yourself.
- Check the tides and the weather when planning your trip. Be aware that weather conditions such as recent storms and strong winds can affect the tides. If in doubt about your timing or tidal conditions contact the local coastguard and have them approve your plans. A seven day forecast of tides and weather is available via the [BBC website](#).
- On sunny days apply sunblock and wear a hat. In chalk cliff areas particularly the effect of the sun is intensified by reflection from the cliffs.
- Wear appropriate clothing and supportive footwear with good grips
- Tell a contact on shore what time you are going and what time you expect to be back. Arrange with them to contact the coastguard if they haven't heard from you by that time.
- Take a fully charged mobile phone with you and in an emergency contact the Coastguard by dialling 999. Remember, however, that many coastal or remote areas may not have a signal. In this case it is worth trying to send a text to your shore contact as these sometimes work if they catch a momentary signal.
- Identify your nearest landmark in case you have to make an emergency call.
- Don't walk close to the cliff base if the area is prone to rock falls. Do not explore caves in cliffs in these areas and never climb up or down unstable cliffs.
- Do not go into, or get close to, unstable structures or buildings.
- Never go out onto mud flats or salt marshes unless you are sure it is safe to do so.
- Take particular care on slippery rocks and always look where you are walking, this includes not stepping backwards while trying to frame a photograph
- If you come across an item that looks like it might be Second World War ordnance **do not touch it**. If you can do so safely take a photograph, mark the position and report it to the Coastguard.
- Do not touch any containers or drums that may contain hazardous substances or waste. Report any such item to the Environment Agency incident hotline by dialling 0800 80 70 60.
- Avoid disturbing wild animals. Take particular care during bird breeding season, roughly May-September. Injured or trapped animals can be reported to the RSPCA by dialling 0300 1234 999.

### *Things to take with you:*

- Plenty of liquids and enough food to cover unexpected delays
- A good map (e.g OS Explorer)
- A whistle
- A compass
- An emergency first aid kit
- Extra warm clothes, sunblock, waterproofs, a hat according to the weather
